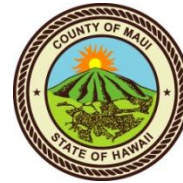

Members introduce themselves and the perspective they represent (education, employer, etc.).</p> <p>The co-chairs go over pre-meeting materials and get agreement on the purposes of the Panel, define the problem statement(s) that will form 3-4 focus areas, and exchange information requested prior to the meeting.</p> <p>Industry leaders identify the workforce concerns and comment on the connection with education, training and recruitment. They should address why industry is at the table for this discussion. What is keeping them up at night related to the workforce needs in these targeted skill sets?</p> <p>Discuss what each group brings to the table—resources, assets, and requirements. Obtain agreement on desired outcomes for the Panel.</p>
