

Ten years ago, Waimanalo residents approached CTAHR about growing more Hawaiian taro at the Waimānalo Research Station. We first started growing taro in the corner of the old Waimanalo quarry. Ten years later, we have grown the original collection to be large enough to share huli with many organizations across O`ahu. Huli was initially obtained from UH CTAHR's Moloka`i and Kaua`i research stations along with `ohana donations.

Come and visit the UH CTAHR Waimānalo Kalo Germplasm Collection on Saturday, March 17, 2018. Spend the morning learning about: the history of CTAHR's taro collection; how we manage the collection using conventional and organic production practices; and our struggles and success stories dealing with new and re-occurring pests. Walk through our dryland kalo fields and network with Hawaii's agricultural agencies and local farmers. Fun for the whole family.

Please dress and plan appropriately for farm conditions, rain or shine. Calcium oxalate in Kalo (*Colocasia esculenta*) can cause skin, throat and eye irritations. Please do not eat anything without proper cooking.
