## Farm Labor Statistics State of Hawaii, Second Half 2024

Hawaii's hired agricultural workforce remained steady at 5,000 workers in both reference weeks in the second half of 2024.<sup>1</sup> However, the average working hours per hired worker during the reference weeks of October 6-12 and July 7-13, 2024, declined by 2% compared to the corresponding periods in the previous year. Gross wage rates for all hired workers decreased slightly from April 7-13 and January 7-13, 2024.

In the U.S. fiscal year ending 2024, Hawaii agribusinesses hired 465 guest workers through the H-2A visa program, a 37% increase from the 340 workers in the prior year. The gross hourly wage for guest workers was \$3.13 lower at the higher end of the range, compared to the average wage for all hired workers.<sup>2</sup> The distribution of locally employed H-2A workers was as follows: coffee (93), apiculture (47), livestock (10), and general farm labor (315).



The visa approval rate was up to 82% in the same period (315,953 H-2A visas were issued), which is the second highest visa approval rate and the highest number of issuance since FY 2010.
