STANDARDS FOR HAWAII-GROWN LETTUCE*

This UNOFFICIAL COPY of standards for lettuce, rewritten for easy interpretation, is based on Chapter 4-41, Hawaii Administrative Rules, Standards for Fresh Fruits and Vegetables. The general provisions of this Chapter, summaries of standards for other fruits and vegetables, and official copies of the complete chapter are available in each county.

Cleanness: In addition to the above requirements, heads of lettuce designated as HAWAII FANCY, HAWAII GRADE AA, HAWAII GRADE A or HAWAII GRADE B shall be clean (12) and those heads designated as HAWAII NO. 1 shall be fairly clean (13). Lettuce designated as HAWAII NO. 2 shall be free from damage caused by dirt (see Table 1, Classification of Defects).

 $\overline{\text{OFF-GRADE}}$. "Off-Grade" is not a grade within the meaning of these standards, but is a descriptive term applicable to lettuce which have a market value, and designates a quality lower than the lowest applicable Hawaii, other states or the United States grade for lettuce.

APPLICATION OF TOLERANCES. Averages for the entire lot, based on examination of representative samples, shall be within the tolerances specified, but the contents of individual containers in any lot may vary from the specified tolerances subject to the following limitations:

When the tolerance specified is more than 5 percent, individual packages in any lot may contain not more than 1-1/2 times the tolerance, provided that at least one specimen which fails to meet the requirements shall be permitted in any container.

When the tolerance specified is 5 percent or less, individual packages in any lot may contain not more than double the tolerance, provided that at least one specimen which fails to meet the requirements shall be permitted in any container.

APPLICABLE GRADE TERMS. Lettuce shall be classified in accordance with the grading system designated below:

Wholesale Quantities - HAWAII FANCY, HAWAII NO. 1 or HAWAII NO. 2, whichever is applicable.

Consumer Packages and Bulk Displays

- HAWAII GRADE AA, HAWAII GRADE A or HAWAII GRADE B, whichever is applicable.

DEFINITIONS.

(1) "Similar varietal characteristics" means the heads have the same characteristic leaf growth. For example, lettuce of the Iceberg and Big Boston types shall not be mixed.

- (2) "Fresh" means the head is crisp, although the wrapper leaves or, in the absence of wrapper leaves, one or two head leaves may be slightly wilted.
 - (3) "Firm" means that as applied to:

Iceberg type lettuce, the head is compact but may yield slightly to moderate pressure.

Big Boston type lettuce, the head is fairly compact.

- (4) "Fairly firm" when applied to heads of Iceberg type lettuce means the head is fairly compact and has good head formation and is not soft or spongy; and when applied to Big Boston type lettuce means the head is not soft or spongy.
- (5) "Well formed" means the head is resonably symmetrical and midribs are not protruding or abnormally prominent.
- (6) "Fairly well formed" means the head is fairly symmetrical and not decidedly off shape in any respect, and the midribs are not excessively prominent and protruding.
- (7) "Not badly misshapen" means the midribs are not badly curved and do not protrude excessively, although the head may be asymmetrical and irregular in shape.
- (8) "Well trimmed" means the butt is trimmed-off neatly close to the point of attachment of the outer leaves and the outermost leaves of the head show some shade of green color. In addition, no wrapper leaves shall be permitted on lettuce sold direct to consumers, and lettuce sold in wholesale quantities shall have no more than 4 wrapper leaves per head, provided such wrapper leaves are not coarse, materially torn or badly blistered. "Wrapper leaves" means leaves which do not closely enfold the compact portion of the head.
- (9) "Excessively trimmed" means the outer head leaves have been removed exposing the tender, inner leaves.
- (10) "Well grown" means the heads or the plants are not stunted or poorly developed.
 - (11) "Burst" mans the head is broken open.
- (12) "Clean" means the head is practically free from dirt or other foreign material.
- (13) "Fairly clean" means the appearance of the head or plant is not materially affected by the presence of dirt or other foreign material.
 - (14) "Doubles" means two heads on the same stem.
- (15) "Damage" means any specific defect described in Table 1, Classification of Defects; or an equally objectionable variation of any one of these defects,

(16) "Serious damage" means any specific defect described in Table 1, Classification of Defects; or an equally objectionable variation of any one of these defects, any other defect, or any combination of defects, which materially detracts from the appearance, or the edible or shipping quality of the lettuce.

Table 1. Classification of Defects
