Aloha e Chair Hurd and members of the Board of Agriculture,

My name is Amy Muramatsu from Makawao, Maui. Thank you for providing updates on the department's Invasive Species Action Plans. These updates are appreciated but do not reflect the urgency communities feel while keiki, kūpuna, and pets are experiencing painful bites and niu and crops are being decimated.

It has been 18 months since amendments to HAR Chapter 4-72 were first proposed to establish intraand inter-island quarantines for pest-infested plants and materials, and 7 months since the public hearing was held. This delay is unacceptable.

These quarantine rules are crucial in the all-hands-on-deck fight against the rapid spread of invasive pests like little fire ants and coconut rhinoceros beetles, to new areas and on new islands. Nurseries, landscapers and suppliers of soil and compost are significant vectors for the spread of these pests, including into regions where they had been previously eradicated.

Therefore, I respectfully and strongly urge the Board to bring the proposed quarantine rule amendments for review and approval at your next meeting. We urgently need these long-overdue regulatory tools, to prevent more costly damage, and to ensure that our community efforts to combat invasive pests are not in vain.

Aloha,

I am writing to express the support of the Big Island Invasive Species Committee for the proposed changes to HAR Ch. 72. As a resident of an island which has for many years experienced the worst and most widespread impacts of invasive species, I am only too familiar with the significant negative consequences of introduced pests spreading beyond the point of control.

We previously submitted testimony to the Plant & Animal Committee in January of 2024 to support these changes. At that time, there had been only one detection of CRB larvae on the Big Island. Since then, 5 adult CRB have been found, and as of last week, BIISC has confirmed CRB damage to palms in the Waikoloa area. We believe that CRB eradication is still fully possible on our island, but an additional introduction to another part of the island could make the difference between eradication and CRB infestation of Hawai'i Island becoming an inevitability. Although the recently passed interim rule is helpful in decreasing the risk of beetles moving off of Oahu, the proposed Ch 4-72 rules will restart the much more comprehensive CRB prevention compliance agreement program, and will bring the assurance that the regulations will not expire - again - in one year.

We urge the Board to accept the changes and move quickly to ensure they are enacted. The updated HAR Ch.72 would allow for HDOA to undertake important actions essential to ensuring that CRB does not spread on Hawai'i Island and join the cadre of other pests, like little fire ant and coqui, that have become an unfortunate part of life here. These rules can also strengthen the Department's ability to stop the possible movement from the Big Island of highly destructive pests like Queensland longhorn beetle and two-lined spittlebug.

HAR Ch 72 is just one step on the road to improving Hawaii's biosecurity, but it is a critical step and the sooner taken, the better.
